




# WELCOME TO THE WORLD TRANSFORMED

# ACCESSIBILITY INFORMATION

## ACCESS INFORMATION POINTS

There will be one main access information point @ Old Steine Gardens, BN1 1EL, open from 9am - 9pm every day, where someone from TWT can support you with information on accessibility around Brighton, additional information on each of the venues and will be able to advise you on any specific requests. We will also be handing out priority badges to anyone who would like special assistance throughout the Festival. There will be secondary information points at other major venues such as Brighthelm centre and Friends Meeting house, but these may vary by day.

## WHEELCHAIR AND MOBILITY ACCESS

All our venues are wheelchair accessible and have accessible bathrooms. Some venues may have a separate entrance for wheelchair users so please look for signs or ask a volunteer. Priority seating is also available for each of the session spaces.

## VISUAL AND AUDIO ACCESS

Presentations have been designed in VI-friendly formats and audio loops have been installed in the larger session spaces.

## DOG-FRIENDLY SPACES

All venues welcome guide and assistance dogs, and there will be water and snacks available. Some venues are situated by green areas where dogs can rest and take a break (Utopia @ The Old Steine Gardens, Brighthelm, Friends Meeting House and Brighton Table Tennis Club). If you require further information please check at the access desk or ask a volunteer.

## CRECHE AND CHILD-FRIENDLY SPACES

Children are welcome everywhere at The World Transformed. A creche is available throughout the weekend (9am-7pm) in Middle Street Primary School, 37 Middle St, Brighton BN1 1AL. The creche is open to children over the age of 2.

We will be providing child-friendly spaces in the main venues, where children can engage in activities whilst parents / carers attend sessions in the same room. Parents are welcome to breastfeed in any venue, or use one of the quiet spaces.


## AFFORDABILITY AND CATERING

At The World Transformed we believe that income should not be a barrier to participation. That is why we have released a number of free tickets for the unwaged, reduced tickets for students and those on low wages, and 'solidarity' tickets for those on higher incomes.

Food will be available throughout the event at affordable prices, and where possible, those on higher incomes will be encouraged to donate more. The World Transformed Cafe, located at the Old Steine Gardens, will be providing affordable meals throughout the festival. Catering has been arranged taking into account a variety of dietary requirements, and details of ingredients and allergens can be found in the Cafe.

## OTHER ARRANGEMENTS

A quiet space will be accessible in each major venue. At the parties, some seating will be provided, and trained volunteers will be on hand to help. There will be at least one gender neutral toilet available on each venue. Look out for sign posting, or ask a volunteer.



## TO NOTE

Apart from some of the parties, the variety show and the screening of 'Sorry We Missed You', wristbands grant you access to all activities. However, sessions will operate on a first-come, first-served basis and each venue has a limited capacity, so please arrive early to the sessions you want to participate in! If there's any specific support or assistance you may need during the festival, please just ask a volunteer.

# THE WORLD TRANSFORMED AT OLD STEINE GARDENS

This is the biggest TWT yet and to meet demand, we've created our own purpose-built utopia in the heart of Brighton. **The World Transformed @ Old Steine Gardens** is a space to relax between sessions, hear incredible speakers, and enjoy cheap and delicious food and drink.

The whole area, which is free and open to the public, has been transformed through some spectacular installations - from Darren Cullen's **'The Museum of Neoliberalism'** to our 'Polis', the democratic heart of the festival in homage to ancient Greek Agora. The TWT Big Tent will play host to **COMMUNITY** - our huge opening night party - alongside experimental sessions, socials and rallies led by the likes of Jeremy Corbyn, John McDonnell, Laura Pidock and Dianne Abbott. Nestled amongst

the flowers sits the TWT Activities Tent, hosting creative workshops on everything from subvertising and propaganda to socialist physical theatre, poetry open mics and collective listening sessions on the history of sound system culture.

With stalls from grassroots campaigns alongside publishers including Verso, Left Book Club, Acorn Brighton, Red Pepper, Pluto, Momentum, Haymarket, Repeater and Democracy Collaborative, come and learn about vital campaign and stock up on all the latest left literature. On Sunday from 10-4, drop by the stalls area to take part in activities on video games about workplace organising.

Join us at Old Steine Gardens to wind down, have fun, and catch up with old comrades and friends.

## ABOUT THE PROGRAMME

So here we are at The World Transformed, and spoilt for choice on what to do thanks to the stellar array of workshops, panels, walking tours, performances and event sports tournaments to choose from.

If you're not sure where to start, fear not, because I sat down with TWT's programme coordinators, Annie Quick, Ben Beach and Dalia Gebrial, to get the lowdown on the lineup.

The programme is focused on issues where the Labour Party need to embrace radical positions, including on drug reform, immigration and internationalism. And by learning about and

mobilising around these areas, Dalia, Ben and Annie hope the movement will be stronger, more strategic and better focused by the end of the festival. “People can go back to their local parties and hopefully be more effective political organisers,” explains Ben.

Expect lots of comradely policy-oriented discussions and activities because this year TWT is backing its radical ideas up with practical policy solutions. For the first time, we will present a crowd-sourced ‘Manifesto For The Movement’ at the end of the festival to shadow chancellor John McDonnell amongst others.

Many of us are deeply passionate about tackling the climate crisis and believe that urgent and drastic change is needed. Luckily, there are sessions every day on sustainability, climate justice or the Green New Deal.

If there's one policy area in need of a breakthrough, it's Brexit – and rather than shying away from difficult conversations, the programme includes a stream of sessions on key issues. “The Brexit debate, even within the left, has been so toxic and unhelpful. We hope that people can have a sensible conversation on how we respond to this moment,” Annie tells me.

But what really sets this festival apart from previous years is an even stronger emphasis on participation.

Many sessions depart from the top-down panel discussions we often find at political conferences. Look through the programme and you'll notice fun, experimental formats - from strategy games and treasure hunts to collective music-listening sessions.

Ben and Dalia's reasons for this are clear: we must challenge who we've been taught to perceive as the ‘experts’. Too often, people have internalised the idea that expertise can only come from someone in a suit with an Oxbridge degree. This year, we are being offered the chance to shape the future of our movement and have fun whilst we're doing it

Of course, it's not all about policy - this year's TWT is equally dedicated to exploring arts and culture in

an explicitly political fashion. Film screenings, music, playwriting, poetry and even the parties are not sidelined but play a fundamental role in the festival. “If we're serious about being transformative rather than reformist then we have to take a leap of faith through the arts, through theatre, through creativity,” says Annie. The closing party is set to be big: make sure you get a ticket before they sell out.

On the whole, this year's content is quite different from the 2018 programme, with Ben, Dalia and Annie intentionally platforming a long list of organisations that haven't worked with TWT before. They suggest attendees be similarly adventurous. “Try not to play it safe. Don't only go to the sessions that look familiar but use this as a moment to engage with the circles you don't typically move in,” Dalia advises.

As our conversation draws to a close, the TWT coordinators make one final request: “we want people to go full out on friendliness,” says Annie. The current political climate is characterised by hate and division. So instead, let's be warm, welcoming and respectful. And who knows – some of the most transformative moments of TWT 2019 might not be in the debates we have, but in the way we choose to connect with each other over the next four days.



After the festival the manifesto will be a living, breathing document that we will share with Transformed events across the country. Local groups will be able to add their own ideas and issues to the manifesto, and the document will be constantly evolving. In this sense, the manifesto is just the beginning of a democratic process that will involve communities from across the country and make us all feel like our voices are being heard again. 


